

Becoming a reader is one of the biggest learning challenges we undertake as humans and this journey can he even more arduous for pupils with additional learning needs. This book is an absolute goldmine of information on how to adapt the way you teach reading to suit the learning needs of pupils with specific and complex needs. Carefully thought-out strategies are underlined by practical experience and backed by research. The author has direct experience of working with a range of pupils with a wide range of different complex needs and this experience and her commitment to helping those children learn is what marks this book out. It's a practical guide written with compassion and experience, and it's designed to educate and to help teachers in both specialist and mainstream classrooms who are working with pupils with these challenges. And help it will.

The engaging question and answer format presents a clear argument for an evidence-led, phonic approach to teaching reading and is mindful of the importance of teaching the bigger picture of reading instruction and how this might be planned for. A careful analysis of the different forms of phonic teaching is followed by very specific guidance on ways to adapt teaching reading for pupils with a range of complex needs, including those who are preverbal or nonverbal. Clear practical advice, backed up by sold research and experience and delivered with compassion, humour and clarity marks out every chapter. What shines out consistently throughout the book is the author's commitment to equity. Everyone has the right to learn how to read and the author offers practical support and resources on how to make this possible.

This is a fascinating book that will help you stand alongside pupils with complex learning needs and gain some understanding and insight into the issues they are facing. It will then tell you how to help them. My personal favourite takeaway? It's got to be the 'Big Oops!' reading strategy! I loved this book so much I've read it twice already. It is an excellent guide on teaching reading for teachers working with all pupils, including and specifically those with complex learning needs, and should be read by anyone interested in understanding how to make the sometimes-challenging journey to becoming a reader actually work. It's definitely going on my resources shelf, and I know it will be well thumbed!
